### **Aims and Objectives**

The module is designed to familiarise students with the following issues and topics:

- Major theoretical approaches to the study of European integration and EU policy-making
- Organisational structures and internal decision-making processes of the main EU institutions
- Formal procedures and informal practices governing the interactions of EU institutions
- The relative power of different actors within and across EU institutions in legislative decisionmaking
- The consequences of different rule configurations, process characteristics, and power distributions amongst actors for the EU's democratic legitimacy
- Independent research on EU policy-making using news sources, archives, and databases accessible online

#### **Contents**

The aim of this module is to develop students' understanding of how the legislative system of the European Union works. Special attention is given to the roles and organizational structures of the different institutions involved in the EU policy-making process. The first part of the module discusses theories of integration and policy-making, presents the internal organization, functions, and powers of the main EU institutions, and describes the most important inter-institutional decision-making procedures. The second part takes a closer look at EU policy-making in different policy areas. This part highlights the differences in content, rules and procedures of decision-making processes across policy fields.
