An I-Grade provides students with the opportunity to repeat assessment(s) over the summer with no academic penalty if a student has a crisis issue that prevents completion of assessments during the year. An email was sent to all students on Friday from the Provost's Office reminding them that the I-Grade portal will be open from today Monday 26th April (noon) to Wednesday 19th May (5pm).

To support students who may find themselves in an immediate crisis due to COVID-19 and, where relevant, have taken reasonable action, the institution has created a COVID-19 exceptional I-Grade, which covers all **non-health, non-counselling, and non-chaplaincy** issues related specifically to COVID-19. The regulations pertaining to the I-Grade process are covered within section 4.2.3 of our Handbook of Academic Regulations and Procedures, which is available here.
