
Welcome to the University of Limerick



Introduction

Established as an educational institution in 1972 and conferred as University in 1989, the University of Limerick is an independent, internationally focussed university with over 17,000 students. As one of Ireland's foremost universities, we are recognised for our dedication to the student experience, our commitment to graduate employability, our industry-relevant, award-winning research and extensive community engagement.

Located 5km from Limerick City and 20km from Shannon International Airport, the University of Limerick is renowned for possessing one of the most spectacular and environmentally sympathetic modern university campuses anywhere in the world.

A disciplined and rigorous approach to learning challenges students by setting high expectations for their academic performance and matches their potential and ability. Equally, a rigorous approach to programme design and continual curriculum development that is characterised by an ethos of research-led teaching and learning is a defining feature of the institution. Since our foundation, the needs of the communities we serve have also been to the forefront of our activities and have shaped our research and teaching programmes. The realisation that we have a responsibility to promote economic, educational and social development unites us with the community and demands that we remain closely connected to the cultural, economic, professional and business worlds in ways that distinguish us as an institution of higher learning.


Employability has always been at the core of our teaching mission and continues to be a central tenet of our distinctive approach to higher education in Ireland. The inclusion of Cooperative Education and work placement as a compulsory element of all our undergraduate programmes is one of the specific strengths of UL; and is for many students, an incentive to choose UL over other Irish universities and colleges. The result of these sustained efforts means that we occupy a position of immense strength with respect to graduate employability compared to other institutions in Ireland.

We value, support and encourage research excellence with demonstrable academic and societal impact across all disciplines. The research portfolio has expanded steadily in recent years, and our state-ofthe-art research infrastructure has been enhanced through sustained investment and expansion, including funding for large-scale, UL-led national centres. The campus is home to the Nexus Innovation Centre supporting spin-out activity in the region and is central to the UL Enterprise Corridor which hosts numerous indigenous and multinational R&D companies. Adjacent to the University is the National Technology Park (NTP), Ireland's first science/ technology park (263 hectares), which is home to more than 100 indigenous and major multinational corporations employing more than 5,000 people.

Our stated mission within our current strategic plan, UL \otimes 50 is to


"build on the expertise of our scholars in creating, harnessing and imparting knowledge for the benefit of our students and the enrichment of our community".



Capital Development Plan

During the period 2014 to 2020 the University completed the implementation of a €225m Capital Development Plan.

A plan for the period 2020 to 2025 has been prepared and is currently being re-evaluated in light of Covid impact on future capital investment requirements and funding.

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New Developments Underway Include:

+ NEW STUDENT LIFE CENTRE

The new Student Centre, a 3,529 square metre building set over three storeys, is in a prime front of house location adjacent to the Stables Complex and the Glucksman Library. The facility, the total project cost of which is in the region of €20m, is being funded on a partnership basis between the students and the University. The new Student Centre - a 'Centre for Student Life' as articulated by the students - will support the student journey through UL and will be a space where students can relax, play, be informed and supported.

+ CLIMBING WALL

Work on the 250m² climbing wall adjacent to UL Arena was completed in October 2020. The design caters for both fun and expert climbers of all ages and capabilities. The climbing wall is Ireland's tallest, standing at 21 metres and equipped with an ability to cater for the new Olympic sports of speed climbing.

+ EXTERNAL LIFT - FOUNDATION BUILDING


Work is underway on the construction of an external lift on the southern elevation of the Foundation Building, University of Limerick consisting of a brick three storey lift enclosure of a height of 13m and an area of 16m², between plaza level and lower ground floor terrace level with a glazed link to the first floor level of the Foundation Building. Construction was completed in 2021.

Future Capital Developments:

+ CITY CENTRE CAMPUS

The University is committed in its Strategic Plan to the development of the UL Limerick City Campus. In the medium term it is planned to locate a significant landmark building on the former Dunnes Stores site. The timing of the development of this landmark building will be determined by the availability of funding.

The UL Limerick City Campus is expected to involve the development of two linked buildings; a university teaching building, which will accommodate 4,000 students and 350 staff and a self-funded student accommodation residence of 600 study bedrooms. The two buildings will deliver 42,825m² of high quality teaching infrastructure and living space.

Commitment to Equality and Diversity, Health and Well-being

UL takes great pride in being one of the first institutions in Ireland to achieve (in July 2015) an Athena SWAN (AS) Bronze Institution Award. Since then, we have worked hard to embed AS across all faculties and departments.

UL applied for the Athena SWAN expanded charter, introduced in Ireland in November 2017, rather than renewing the AS STEMM standard, which primarily focuses on the careers of women in STEMM.

We are the first institution to upgrade our existing award to the expanded charter and the second university in Ireland to be awarded the expanded charter. This award recognises work undertaken to address gender equality more broadly, in arts, humanities, social sciences, business and law (AHSSBL), and in professional and support roles, and for trans staff and students.



Athena SWAN therefore is not just about one gender but promotes equality and diversity across all disciplines.

Equality and Human Rights Strategy

In 2019 UL produced its Equality and Human Rights Strategy 2019-2022, which builds on UL@50, the University of Limerick Strategic Plan 2019-2024. Setting out core objectives and actions for the next three years, the strategy consolidates our commitment to equality and human rights at the highest level.

Putting Research at the Core of UL

The renewed research strategy is currently in development and marks the next phase of our growth. In this phase we seek to put research at the core of our university by building on our strengths, ensuring our systems and supports are enabling research excellence to create a world-class, research-led institution.

Our world is changing rapidly, the global pandemic has tasked us to respond. This responsiveness to some of the world's greatest challenges is part of the UL DNA. We are a community of problemsolvers. By tackling challenges from clean energy to reducing inequalities, championing quality education to creating stronger communities and protecting our environment, this young agile university provides solutions and partners for change.

The research focus at the University of Limerick is characterised by the convergence of discrete disciplines working together to achieve fundamental breakthroughs whilst adopting a translational approach to ensure research is rapidly translated into economic and social impacts for Ireland and beyond.

Our research addresses areas of importance to our society, such as education, languages, healthcare and social inclusion and has significant impact on sectors that are vital to our economy, such as pharmaceuticals, med-tech, software, food, communications and energy.

Bernal Institute hosts a multidisciplinary team of world-leading materials scientists and engineers at UL. Bernal represents a €100m+ investment in world-class characterisation, modelling and manufacturing facilities concentrated in 20,000m of high-quality research space.

Our mission is to develop disruptive technologies related to Health, Energy and Environment that will create a legacy of scientific achievement in structured materials research that benefits future generations. Bernal research is organised across bio materials, composite materials, molecular and nano materials and process engineering.



Health Research Institute

Health Research Institute is a cross faculty institute that brings together researchers in UL and its partner institutions with a focus on convergent and translational health research. The mission of the HRI is to conduct outstanding person-centred research to enhance the health and well-being of individuals and transform the health environment for the population. The HRI strives to support interdisciplinary research groups that are committed to expanding health research through a variety of collaborative efforts. Within the HRI research is organised into health technologies, lifestyle and health, health services delivery and public and patient involvement in healthcare.





UL has always been renowned for the depth and value of our contribution to the economic, educational, social and cultural life of Ireland in general and the Shannon region in particular. We will continue to increase the level of interaction between our students and community groups, develop a culture of access & lifelong learning in our communities and extend the presence of the University in Limerick city. We will promote the city and region by providing community access to our campus and all its excellent amenities, and we will encourage environmental and social responsibility within and beyond the campus.

- + Access & Life-Long Learning UL has a proud tradition of supporting Access and progression to higher education with almost 30% of our undergraduate students classified as non-traditional entrants. This work is supported by a long established physical presence in the city at UL Access Campus, a community-based facility that aims to raise aspirations amongst school children from disadvantaged communities.
- + Local Economic Development UL actively collaborates with industry; engages in incubation activities; enhances skill levels; creates spin-out companies; and is a key driver of the region's and the nation's economic development goals. UL is also committed to sustaining and extending the range of successful collaborations with Limerick City and County Council as the city and region drives towards the realisation of its highly ambitious and transformative "Limerick 2030" vision.
- Student Engagement UL has the largest student volunteering programme in Ireland through its annual President Volunteering Award programme which contributes thousands of student volunteering hours each year to local community and voluntary organisations.
- Staff Engagement 'UL Engage' serves as the tangible hub for a wide diversity of civic engagement activities across campus and works with all divisions and faculties to amplify, incubate and coordinate the various ways that faculty and staff in the University of Limerick can work to make a difference.




















Limerick & the Mid-West Region

Limerick is the third most populous city in Ireland, and is located in Ireland's Mid-West region. It is situated at a strategic position on the majestic River Shannon with four main crossing points near the city centre.

The earliest settlement in the city dates back to the pre-Viking and Viking eras. History also records an important battle involving Cormac mac Airt in 221 and a visit by St. Patrick in 434. Records show that, in 812 the Vikings sailed up the Shannon and pillaged the city. The Normans redesigned the city in the 12th century and added much of the most notable architecture, such as King John's Castle and St Mary's Cathedral.

In early medieval times Limerick was at the centre of the Kingdom of Thomond which corresponds to the present day Mid-West Region. One of the kingdom's most notable kings was Brian Boru, ancestor of the O'Brien Clan of Dalcassians. The word Thomond is synonymous with the region and is retained in place names such as Thomondgate, Thomond Bridge and Thomond Park, home ground of Munster rugby.

In addition to being the region's capital, Limerick City is also a main tourist destination along the Wild Atlantic Way tourist trail that extends the entire Atlantic seaboard along the west coast of Ireland. Limerick also benefits from having an excellent road and rail infrastructure, linking it to other major centres as well as Shannon airport (40 minutes), Cork airport (70 minutes) and Dublin airport (2 hours).

This allows for the pursuit of a vast range of recreational activities including cycling, yachting, kayaking, fishing, shooting, hunting and hill walking to name but a few. It has a number of blue-flag sandy beaches within close proximity; and the country's third largest lake (130 sq.km.), Lough Derg, only a short distance from the city, is one of the region's recreational gems. The University's own Sports Adventure Centre at Lough Derg provides an array of sporting activities with state of the art equipment and professional staff.



Limerick – a City Region on the Rise

While Limerick is a long established and proven location for international business, it is also Ireland's most future focused city, committed to innovation and economic growth.

Limerick's current economic resurgence has not happened by chance. Like any success, it's been based on smart planning, hard work and collaboration. The framework for this resurgence has been the Local Authority's 'Limerick 2030 - an Economic and Spatial Plan for Limerick'.

The plan set ambitious targets for over €1 billion in enterprise and investment infrastructure to transform Limerick through the economic, social and physical renaissance of Limerick City Centre and the wider Mid West Region. Encouragingly, it is already way ahead of targets in a number of key areas, particularly employment.

With multiple engines of growth making significant advancements and, more importantly, working in collaboration, it's a region on the rise.







Economic Renaissance

Sitting on the majestic River Shannon, Limerick is currently enjoying an economic renaissance, with record investment and employment through indigenous and foreign direct investment. Some 12,000+ jobs have been created here over the past five years across FDI and indigenous investment, reflecting a pro-business and competitive operating environment that is winning many over.

Improvements in road infrastructure have brought Limerick's population catchment to 500,000 people living within one hour of the city and almost 50% of them under 35 years. Limerick also has a 70,000 third level student population base within a 90 minute radius, including three third level institutions of its own. The city is also just 2hrs 30mins from the capital.

Accessibility

In addition to having an international airport, Shannon Airport, on its doorstep with daily services to the UK, Europe and the US, it has an excellent rail and motorway network and two busy commercial ports, one in the city and a second down river at Foynes, at the mouth of the Shannon Estuary, which boasts some of Europe's deepest waters – essential for growth in ship size sailing the high seas.

Quality of Life

Limerick offers an excellent quality of life, with residential prices 30% lower than the national average. It also offers an outstanding mix of high quality primary and second level schools. It has a vibrant cultural offering. It has the spiritual home of Irish rugby, the world-famous Thomond Park; also boasts one of the country's largest Gaelic Games stadiums and the fourth largest stadium of any kind in Ireland, the Gaelic Grounds; has a thriving arts community, as evidenced by its selection as Ireland's first National City of Culture, having a world-famous school of art and design (Limerick School of Art and Design) and much celebrated night life. Its most recent sporting achievement was Limerick winning the 2018 All Ireland Hurling championship.

Limerick is also a key gateway to the Wild Atlantic Way – one of the fastest growing tourism driving routes in the world – and just 90 minutes from world-famous destinations such as the Cliffs of Moher, Ring of Kerry and the Rock of Cashel.


