GEMS has received a National DELTA (Disciplinary Excellence in Teaching Learning & Assessment) Award from the National Forum for Teaching & Learning. This was one of eleven awards from a total of 48 submissions.

DELTA awards are major national level awards for Irish higher education teaching and form an integral part of the overall National Learning Impact Awards system designed to enhance and strengthen teaching excellence in higher education by recognizing the value of teaching at a national level. The application process is challenging, and each submission is assessed rigorously by an expert panel of reviewers. Criteria for the awards include Excellence, Exceptionality, Impact, Communication and Authenticity to the discipline.

The title of the GEMS Submission was *"Integrated Medical Education – Learning for life"* which highlighted the achievements and impact of the Year 1 & 2 BMBS curriculum.

GEMS and University of Massachusetts Boston Collaboration Project

Dr Khalifa Elmusharaf and Ms Amy Hannigan visited the University of Massachusetts Boston on the 17th to 24th of March 2018. The visit was part of the collaboration project between GEMS and UMass Boston (UMB). The Project leaders are Dr Khalifa Elmusharaf and Dr Carlos Eduardo Siqueira, Associate Professor of Community Development and Planning at UMass Boston.

An agreement was reached to conduct a GEMS / UMB joint summer school in Global Maternal and Newborn Health in Limerick during 2019. The summer school will incorporate public health, clinical, war and peace, project management and research skills into the summer school. UMB William Joiner Institute for the Study of War and Social Consequences and UMB Mauricio Gastón Institute for Latino Community Development and Public Policy, will contribute to teaching in the Summer School. As part of this collaboration, GEMS will host Dr Carlos as a Fulbright scholar in April 2019 and he will be working with Dr Khalifa Elmusharaf to design and deliver the Summer School and to work on the Postgraduate Programme in Global Health.

"MOVE FOR LIFE" - HSE Funded Trial to Promote Physical Activity In Older Adults

A research study, aimed at improving the health of people aged over 50 in the county, was launched on April 30th by Catherine Byrne TD. University of Limerick's "Move for Life" research programme was awarded €420,000 in research funding to test an intervention to promote physical activity in those who are aged over 50 and who would like to be more active. The participants will be given opportunities to take part in walking, cycling or general exercise programmes for periods of up to 12 weeks. The research team, coled by UL's Professors Catherine Woods and Liam Glynn, brings together expertise from sport and exercise science, medicine, physiotherapy, psychology, implementation science and the community. "According to national guidelines, all adults should be engaged in at least 150 minutes of moderate activity each week with a focus on aerobic activity, musclestrengthening and balance. Yet few meet these physical activity guidelines, including at least 63% of people in Limerick and 57% of people in Clare," explained Professor Woods.

MOVE SO TO

According to UL President, Dr Des Fitzgerald, "Move for Life is a project that focuses on those of us who are over 50, who would like to be more active".

The Move for Life research project is funded under the Health and Positive Aging Initiative (HaPAI), led by the Department of Health and is a joint national programme with the Health Service Executive and Atlantic Philanthropies.

The launch of PPI Ignite at UL took place on Tuesday 20th March when members of the PPI Ignite Team came together for a training day in Patient and Public Involvement (PPI) and Participatory Health Research (PHR).

Patient and Public Involvement in health research is important and UL's Health Research Institute (HRI) have secured funding from the Health Research Board (HRB) and the Irish Research Council (IRC) to strengthen this at the University. UL was among five Universities nationally to receive the HRB funding award of €348,909 to 'Ignite' partnerships for Public and Patient Involvement (PPI) in research. The UL team led by Professor Anne MacFarlane, with excellent support from Dr. Jon Salsberg and the HRI core team, worked closely community stakeholders with from the Limerick City Community Development Programme and Care Alliance Ireland as well as health sector stakeholders from University Hospital Limerick Patient Advocacy Liaison Services and the HSE Community Care office. As a result of this successful, co-designed bid, there will be activities involving UL health researchers, community and health sector stakeholders for training and networking to collaboratively set research priorities and progressing policies and procedures to further strengthen the culture for PPI in UL.

Dr Natasha Slattery (Intern Network) demonstrated the adult simulator to great excitement and the UL Teddy Bear Hospital held a session for all the sick teddy bears assisted by the UL Paediatrics Society; the children really enjoyed these sessions and many teddy bears have recuperated and made a full recovery.

On the 19th May, the School of Law and Graduate Entry Medical School hosted an interdisciplinary conference 'Medical Error and the Healthcare Profession: *Perspectives and Lessons from Practice*', which united a range of medicolegal experts on key areas of law and attracted both legal and medical practitioners.

The conference saw speakers provide detailed insights into the civil, criminal and regulatory responses to medical error. Dr. Ciaran Craven SC and Asim Sheikh considered ongoing developments in medical negligence litigation in the first panel of the day, whilst the second panel explored the response of the criminal law to medical error, with Dr. Danielle Griffiths (University of Sussex), Dr. Alexandra Mullock (University of Manchester) and Dr Eimear Spain (University of Limerick) highlighting the problematic nature of the offence of gross negligence manslaughter in a medical context.

The conference was organised by Dr Eimear Spain and Dr Mary Tumelty and was graciously supported by the School of Law and Graduate Entry Medical School.

UL's GEMS and Engineering Respiratory Innovation Recognised at Awards



The new innovative soloPEP device

Interdisciplinary research, led by GEMS Director of Research Professor Colum Dunne, has resulted in development of a novel, daily use, 100% recyclable device for use by patients with cystic fibrosis and COPD.

The OPEP device (oscillating positive expiratory pressure) is designed to replace existing larger devices that are typically used for months at a time and that require daily cleaning, and which are sometimes reservoirs for microbes that are potentially dangerous to patients at risk of infection.

Prof Dunne, who is a microbiologist, has been funded to work closely with respiratory consultants Prof Deirdre McGrath and Dr Barry Linnane alongside engineers Dr Leonard O'Sullivan and PhD candidate Kevin O'Sullivan to optimise their product's design and to make it available to Irish and international patients.

"Ireland has the highest incidence per capita of CF globally" said Professor Dunne "and it seems appropriate that a practical solution to a real-world problem for CF patients and their caregivers be developed in Ireland".

At the time of writing, the soloPEP has been recognised as an innovative approach in respiratory care and is shortlisted for both the Cleveland Clinic-Enterprise Ireland Innovation Award 2018 and the Irish Hospital Professional Award 2018.

U-LEARN Network: University of Limerick GP Education And Research Network sites nationally

With fascinating keynote addresses from Prof Dave Hirsh, newly appointed Director of the Harvard Medical School Academy at Harvard Medical School and Prof Sonya Saxena from Imperial College in London, the U-LEARN General Practice Network was launched in January at the University of Limerick. With a record attendance of GP tutors and a theme of collaboration, the Network which involves over 130 General Practices nationally and approximately 500,000 patients will provide a step change in capacity in education and research at the Graduate Entry Medical School.

Prof Hirsh leads the Longitudinal Integrated Clerkship (LIC) programme at Harvard and first called for "continuity" as a key framework for medical education in his seminal New England Journal paper in 2007.

He described the LIC evidence base for benefits to students in terms of knowledge acquisition, empathy and professionalism and how he felt the 18 week LIC in General Practice at the Graduate Entry Medical School was a tremendous opportunity to deliver on this "continuity" framework.

Prof Saxena went on to describe the potential of the U-LEARN General Practice Network to deliver on the clinical audit and broader professional competence and research requirements for students and General Practitioners alike. Deputy Head of the Graduate Entry Medical School and newly appointed chair in General Practice, Prof Liam Glynn said he was "delighted" with the turnout of GP tutors and the support of the University for the U-LEARN General Practice Network.

"We are really lucky with the high quality of our GP tutors in the U-LEARN General Practice Network and for many of our medical students these tutors will become some of the most influential medical teachers and mentors in their careers as a result of this continuous relationship over the 18 weeks of their clinical attachment in General Practice and beyond" concluded Prof Glynn.

Dr Patrick O'Donnell, Clinical Fellow in Social Inclusion and PhD candidate at UL GEMS attended the 2018 World Organization of Family Doctors (WONCA) Europe Annual Meeting in Poland in order to compete in the Junior Researcher Award final. Chafing the Dream – Running the London Marathon for Cancer Research

I decided to run the London Marathon for Cancer Research UK. I find it hard to find the words to describe that day; nearly three years ago. It was my birthday and my family had travelled to visit me in Cardiff, where I was studying at the time. I knew something was up the minute I saw my parents' faces. My little sister, who was just 18 at the time, took me upstairs to privacy and she told me, through broken sobs, that she had cancer.



It wasn't a blur at all, I remember every

agonising second of it, but we are not alone. The reality is that around 980 people receive a cancer diagnosis every day. As well as Sorcha, in November 2017, our family was dealt another devastating blow when our Uncle Eric was diagnosed with terminal cancer. We sadly lost our Eric in February this year. Life is being snatched from some far too soon; it's time to do something about it. I KNOW I am not alone, when I claim that cancer has affected people I know, people I love.

On April 22nd 2018 I completed the London Marathon, all 26.2 miles of it. It took me 4 hours and 39 minutes and copious amounts of blood, sweat and tears. It was the hottest day recorded in the history of the Marathon with temperature highs of 24.1; although it felt at least 10hotter down on the city pavements of London!

The temperatures don't seem THAT hot, do they? But when you've been training in a winter that gave us Storm Ophelia and ran two of your 20 mile runs in the icy snow, come race day, the heat was a bit of a shock. In the last 3 weeks before the big race, runners taper. Tapering means upping the carb intake (not as easy or fun as you may think) and lowering the running mileage. The weather changed its tune the week of the race, giving no one time to adapt to the warmer temperatures.

Nevertheless, this didn't distract from the momentum of the day. I have never in all my life, seen so many bowls of jelly babies and sweets being held out for us by the crowds, one pub had even dragged the barrels out and were handing out pints at mile 24 (SO tempting).

Cruising down Embankment was the highlight. Starting with mile 21, we FINALLY got out of Canary Wharf (after circling around it for some 9 miles) and onto the home stretch. The course was at long last shielded from the strong sun rays by the towering skyscrapers, so the slight downhill cruise with the shaded breeze was sensational, as you can imagine. The pavements were getting wider and the crowds were getting louder... I couldn't wipe the smile off my face.

The week before the race, I held two cupcake sales in the GEMS lobby to help raise money towards my target of £2,500. The two cake sales alone raised around €600 – which is incredible!! In the end, donations totaled a phenomenal £3,116.75 for Cancer Research UK. So, thank you to all students, staff, friends and family. I am beyond grateful and blown away by your kindness, love and support.

To anyone thinking of running a marathon, don't think about it. Just do it. Yes, the training is long, and the weather is problematic. But commitment to training is easy if you just make the time for it and embrace the challenge with your heart and soul. As long as you are sensible, safe and listen to your body, you can enjoy a truly spectacular journey. There is absolutely nothing that can compare running out of a 600m pitch black tunnel, to deafening eruptions of cheering and support from complete strangers. Just do it, I promise you ... you won't regret it.
