What do we mean by Community?

Community as a term is used as a shorthand for the relationships, bonds, identities and interests that join people together or give them a shared stake in a place, service, culture or activity (Yerbury, 2011).

A community is defined as 'a group of people external to the campus who are affiliated by geographic proximity, special interest, similar situation, or shared values. Communities may share characteristics such as age, ethnicity, gender, or sexual orientation' (Holton et al, 2016).

Engaged Scholarship

At the institutional level, engaged scholarship connects the intellectual assets of the higher education institutions, including faculty expertise and high-quality graduate and undergraduate students, to public issues (Boyer, 1990; 1996; Ramaley, 2004).

At the faculty level, engaged scholarship is a vehicle through which faculty can participate in 'academically relevant work that simultaneously fulfils the campus mission and goals, as well as community needs' (Sandmann, 2003: 4)

At the student level, engaged scholarship can enhance academic learning and knowledge generation because of its ability to blend research, teaching and service (Harkavy, 2004, 2006; Holland, 2005; Schon, 1995)

Community Engaged Learning

Academic Community-engaged learning can be described as a "course-based, credit-bearing educational experience that allows students to, (a) participate in an organized service activity that meets identified community needs and (b) reflect on the service activity in such a way as to gain further understanding of course content, a broader appreciation of the discipline, and an enhanced sense of civic responsibility.

Engaged Research

Engaged Research describes a wide range of rigorous research approaches and methodologies that share a common interest in collaborative engagement with the community and aim to improve, understand or investigate an issue of public interest or concern, including societal challenges. Engaged research is advanced with community partners rather than for them.

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
