What a year 2020 has been! This year the Faculty was conferred with a Bronze Athena Swan Award which recognises our continued commitment to advancing gender equality, representation, progression and success for both staff and students.

2020 also saw UL and the Faculty sign a "game changing" agreement with the Algerian government which aims to support the upskilling of young Algerian Academics to PHD level through a specially designed International Structured PHD programme.

Our Journalism students scooped six of the top prizes at the 2020 National Student Media Awards including Student Journalist of the Year, Video Journalist of the Year, Sports Writer of the Year and awards for Magazine of the Year, Website of the year and Magazine Layout and Design of the Year.

Donal Ryan won the Eason Irish Novel of the Year at the An Post Irish Book awards for his acclaimed novel "Strange Flowers". This follows on from the success of Professor Joseph O'Connor, who won the award last year for his novel "Shadowplay", whilst a graduate of the MA in Creative writing Helena Close was also nominated this year in the Young Adult Fiction category for her novel "The Gone Book".

Our faculty have remained committed to excellence in research and teaching and to engaging with our stakeholders and communities despite this difficult year and there are many examples of this throughout this newsletter issue. I want to thank our colleague Oonagh Grace and our Coop student Emma Larkin for the great work they have done in compiling the issue. I hope you enjoy reading about all the activities and achievements in this most exceptional of years.

Researchers at the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance led innovative research exploring the potential of music to assist people living with chronic pain to improve their health and well-being. Dr. Hilary Moss and Katie Fitzpatrick of the music therapy department at UL, and Prof Dominic Harmon, Consultant Anaesthetist at University Hospital Limerick, worked with members of Chronic Pain Ireland (CPI). CPI is an NGO providing support services to people living with chronic pain and advocating on their behalf.

The field of music, music therapy and chronic pain is underdeveloped in Ireland and Europe. Evidence of the benefit of music in reducing pain is scarce and often has poor rigour. Research was needed in this area and UL and the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance have supported this research through their work and positioning UL as centre for music therapy and pain research in Ireland and Europe. As part of this research appearances were made on Lyric FM (Music and the mind series) and Marian Finucan radio show on RTE1 (November 2019) which brought the research and the role of music therapy for health and wellbeing into the public sphere.

The data gathered revealed that participants found music therapy assisted with emotional release, relaxation, and diversion from pain. It was also found to be a supportive and meaningful occupation for people living with chronic pain.

Dr. Eoin Callery awarded patent for new audio technology

During October, Dr. Callery together with collaborators Jonathan Abel and Elliot Canfield-Dafilou of Stanford University were awarded a patent for a new piece of audio technology capable of generating interactive virtual acoustic spaces. They are now working on developing projects that will seek to use this technology over networks, allowing people in different locations to share the same acoustic space.



Whichcandidate.ie aided voters in making their final decision in General Election 2020



Dr. Rory Costello, Department of Politics and **Public** Administration, developed the which candidate.ie website which helps voters see how their own views align with current election candidates. The first website was piloted for the 2014 local elections in Limerick and after that was launched nationally in subsequent elections. Earlier this year the website was launched ahead of the General election 2020 to give voters further information on candidate choice and gauge which candidate most aligned with their values.

'Shaping Palliative Care Policy using a Human Rights Approach' project funding awarded

The Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission announced funding for projects under its Human Rights and Equality Grants Scheme 2020. Dr. John Lombard (School of Law) and Dr. Owen Doody (Dept of Nursing and Midwifery) were named co-applicants in a successful funding bid led by the All Ireland Institute of Hospice and Palliative Care.



The title of the project is 'Shaping Palliative Care Policy using a Human Rights Approach'. The research project aims to give voice to nursing home residents, their families and care workers in relation to their experience and expectations of palliative care to ensure that any changes to palliative care policy, especially due to Covid-19, will be informed and shaped by the needs and perspectives of rights holders. It will also educate and inform policy makers, service providers, healthcare professionals, the public and specifically people living in nursing homes, their families and care workers on their rights in relation to palliative care during a pandemic.


Partner organisations in the project include the Health Information Quality Authority, Health Service Executive, Mental Health Commission, Nursing Homes Ireland, Irish Hospice Foundation, Age related Healthcare Department Tallaght Hospital, and Medicine for the Elderly St Vincent's Hospital.

Independent Review group - use of Tablet Devices in Schools

Between October 2019 and January 2020 Dr. Ann Marcus-Quinn worked as part of the independent review group tasked with conducting a review of the use of tablet devices at Ratoath College. Dr. Marcus-Quinn presented an overview of the findings to the Louth Meath Education and Training Board in February and the report was published at the end of February 2020.

The findings and recommendations of the review were widely reported in the media and featured on television, radio and the print media. The report was also discussed on social media and the Irish Times described the report as "likely to be influential in shaping how other secondary schools incorporate technology in the classroom". The review group comprised former school principal Cora Dunne and former Deputy Chief Inspector (DES) Dr. Carl Ó Dálaigh. At the start of the physical school closures in March Dr. Marcus-Quinn interviewed by RTE's Education was Correspondent Emma O'Kelly. Dr. Marcus-Quinn has also written a number of articles on technology in schools which have featured in The Irish Times this year. Recently, Senator Ger Craughwell noted her ongoing work with Dr. Tríona Hourigan in the Seanad.





Irish Architectural and Decorative Studies - Dr. David Fleming appointed editor

David Fleming, Dr. Head, Department of History, has been appointed editor of Irish Architectural and Decorative Studies, the only peer-reviewed journal devoted to the study of Irish art, architecture, visual and material culture. The journal, founded in 1998, is published by the Irish Georgian Society, and international attracts an authorship. Dr. Fleming stated that he was "honoured to accept the position, and to follow in the footsteps of several eminent scholars who have edited the journal over the years".



Vulnerable Witnesses Report Published in The International Journal of Evidence and Proof

In May of this year The International Journal of Evidence and Proof published a research article by Dr. Alan Cusack of the School of Law at the University of Limerick.

The article which is entitled, 'Addressing Vulnerability in Ireland's Criminal Justice System: A Survey of Recent Statutory Developments', offers a critical appraisal of recent statutory efforts aimed at securing the increased accommodation of victims of crime with intellectual disabilities within Ireland's criminal trial.

74 days: Inside Terence MacSwiney's Hunger Strike Documentary

Dr. Ciara Breathnach, Department of History, participated in a documentary entitled 74 days: Inside Terence MacSwiney's Hunger Strike, which aired on RTÉ1 on 21 October 2020.



Since 2010 part of Breathnach's research has focused on Prison Medical Officers and their role in disciplining bodies in the carceral context.

She gave a Plenary on 9 October at the commemorative conference on MacSwiney organised by colleagues at University College Cork on 9 October. Her research on Death and Burial: Ireland 1864-1922 is funded by the Irish Research Council and her RTÉ Brainstorm piece on MacSwiney was published on 20 October.

Centre for Early Modern Studies: Research activities

_____ Centre for _____ **Early Modern Studies** Limerick

The Centre for Early Modern Studies, Limerick hosted a lively series of interdisciplinary research seminars in 2020 featuring papers from Dr. Leanne Calvert (Hertfordshire), Dr. Sparky Brooker (Queens University Belfast), Prof. Alison Forrestal (NUIG), Dr. Annaleigh Margey (DkIT) and Dr. Gordon Ó Riain (UL). Since September, the seminars have moved online which has significantly expanded and internationalised the audience. This year's CEMS Dissertation Prize was awarded to Keith Ó Riain of Mary Immaculate College for a dissertation supervised by Dr. Liam Chambers and titled 'Filí na Máighe: A case study of Gaelic Irish mentalité in the mid eighteenth century'. Keith has also been announced as the Global Winner in the History category of the 2020 Undergraduate Awards.

Dr. Richard Kirwan awarded Senior Fellowship in Utrecht

Dr. Richard Kirwan was appointed as a Senior Fellow at the Descartes Centre for the History and Philosophy of the Sciences and the Humanities at the University of Utrecht in February 2020. The University of Utrecht is a leading centre for the intellectual history of the early modern period and is to the fore in advances in digital history.

The Senior Fellowship enabled Richard to ongoing research continue his on experiences of exile and migration among scholarly religious converts in early modern Germany, a project which has been funded by the Gerda Henkel Stiftung. It also provided a platform for intellectual exchange with other scholars at the Descartes Centre opportunities to learn about new digital historical methods for understanding networks.



Personal and social experiences of COVID-19 (PERSOCOV) Survey

To better understand the personal and social consequences of both the pandemic and the consequent social restrictions, a collaborative project between Professor Michael Breen of Mary Immaculate College and Professor Ross Macmillan of the University of Limerick conducted nationally representative survev residents of Ireland. Participants were surveyed in the first week of June 2020 and were asked to retrospectively recount their life circumstances and experiences during the first COVID - 19 restrictions period, during the month of April. In addition to documenting specific details about experiences of social distancing, social isolation, and economic disruption and family change associated with the public health restrictions, survey participants were also asked

- social and psychological responses to the pandemic itself;
- · impacts on health and well-being;
- perceptions of the national, both state and civilian, response to COVID-19;
- assessment of trust in key political entities;
- social attitudes, relationships, and experiences both with respect to family and friends, as well as members of society in general;
- attitudes towards immigration and cultural diversity;
- · impacts on human value priorities; and
- implications for social and institutional trust more generally.

A key feature of the study was the inclusion of survey items that appeared in the Irish panels of European Social Survey (hereafter ESS) who were surveyed biannually from 2002 to 2018, as well as content from the World Values Survey (WVS). Importantly, these surveys allow specific and detailed comparison with earlier data and hence can identify shifts in attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors associated with the pandemic and the resulting public health restrictions. The data are among the first and only nationally representative sample for Ireland and one of the first such surveys in the world dealing with these aspects of the COVID-19 experience.



Postgraduate diploma with the Criminal Assets Bureau

The School of Law and the Criminal Assets Bureau (CAB) are working together on the new Postgraduate Diploma in Proceeds of Crime and Asset Identification which will provide training to law enforcement in the area of proceeds of crime investigation, asset identification, seizure, confiscation and recovery. The objective of the postgraduate diploma is to provide a recognised standard of training for staff in CAB and other law enforcement, regulatory and administrative agencies in both Ireland and internationally who require academic and professional training in the field of specific investigations.

AHSS launch innovative new Graduate Certificate in Equality, Diversity and Inclusion in 2021

The faculty is delighted to launch the new Graduate Certificate in Equality, Diversity and Inclusion led by Dr. Lydia Bracken, Assistant Dean for Equality Diversity and Inclusion, AHSS. The programme is designed for learners who wish to develop an interdisciplinary understanding of equality, diversity and inclusion and to explore strategies for change. The programme will provide learners with the knowledge and understanding needed to deal needed effectively with issues of equality, diversity and inclusion at all levels of Irish society, the community and the workplace. The programme is currently accepting applications for the coming academic year.





The Faculty is committed to implementing a four-year action plan to achieve the commitments made to the Athena SWAN Charter as part of the assessment process. This will serve to improve working practices and to ensure an inclusive culture for all staff and students. The submission Self-Assessment Team, led by Dr. Lydia Bracken, Assistant Dean for Equality, Diversity and Inclusion in AHSS, included representatives from all departments and schools within the Faculty.

Silver Award in Best in Government and Not for Profit: Hate and Hostility Research Group

Dr. Jennifer Schweppe and Dr. Amanda Haynes of the Hate and Hostility Research Group were delighted to accept the Silver Award in the "Best in Government and Not for Profit" category at the 2020 Digital Media Awards on Friday. Jennifer accepted the award along with colleagues at We The People on behalf of the HHRG and the Transgender Equality Network Ireland for their work on the Call It Out campaign. The Call It Out campaign was funded by the European Union and part of a ten country project which sought to raise awareness of homophobia, biphobia, and transphobia.

At the GALAs LGBT+ Awards on February 8th, the HHRG and the Call it Out campaign were shortlisted for two awards: Best Event and Digital Changemaker. The HHRG was longlisted for a GALA LGBT+ Award for Best Ally.



UL's Greentown Project wins first place at European Crime Prevention Awards

The Greentown research project based at University of Limerick has won a major European Crime Prevention award. The innovative research project is a strategic partnership between UL's School of Law and the Department of Justice on the design, implementation and evaluation of youth justice interventions.

The pilot initiative is aimed at disrupting recruitment of children by criminal gangs and was awarded first place at the European Crime Prevention Awards on Friday. The award committee particularly noted that the Greentown project "holds an unparalleled theoretical foundation. It is well designed with a methodological and holistic approach. The project is a good example of a multi-agency approach.... the project is well documented and as a result can be replicated in other countries. Although the project is in its early stages it is considered one to keep a close eye on in the future." Receiving the award on behalf of the Department of Justice, Professor Sean Redmond from the School of Law, University of Limerick said: "I am delighted to accept this award on behalf of the Department of Justice and the University of Limerick. It's terrific that our work in Ireland has been recognised by crime prevention experts across Europe. We are very happy to share our approach with other jurisdictions."

Minister of State at the Department of Justice with responsibility for Youth Justice, James Browne TD, offered his congratulations to the REPPP team (Research Evidence into Policy Programmes and Practice project) who developed Greentown.

Dr. Norah Burns elected to the board of the National Women's Council

Dr. Norah Burns of the School of Law was recently nominated by the Irish Women Lawyers Association to run for election to the board of the National Women's Council. The NWC represents 180 NGO and civil society groups and is the leading national representative organisation for women and women's groups in Ireland. Following the tallying of the votes of the membership of the NWC, Dr. Burns was appointed to the board of the NWC. A non-governmental, not-for-profit organisation, founded in 1973, the NWC seeks to achieve equality for women.




Launch of the BSc in Social Sciences (LM019)

AHSS Faculty Retirements



Launch of New Double Degree MA in European Studies by the German Ambassador to Ireland, Ms Deike Potzel


On 3 March 2020 the German Ambassador to Ireland, Ms Deike Potzel, came to UL to launch the new Double Degree MA in European Studies, a pioneering Masters programme run in co-operation with the Europa Universität Flensburg (EUF) in Germany. The EUF was represented at the launch by Prof. Anne Reichold, Professor of Philosophy and Course Director, BA in European Studies at the EUF.

The MA in European Studies is a two-year programme with semesters 1 and 2 spent at the University of Limerick (UL) and semester 3 and 4 at the partner university. Alternatively, students can apply to study at EUF in first year and spend the second year at UL.

The programme applies the interdisciplinary understanding of European Studies characteristic for UL's undergraduate programme to postgraduate level and aims to give students skills and competencies required in a post-Brexit Europe in key areas such as politics, economics, law, languages and European cultural studies.

During her visit the Ambassador also opened the photo exhibition "Totally East - Life in East Germany" in the Language Learning Hub and introduced the award-winning German film Das schweigende Klassenzimmer / The Silent Revolution (with English subtitles). The Ambassador subsequently discussed the film with fourth year students of German.





from the Old World and the New

An online interdisciplinary symposium was held on 11 November in advance of a forthcoming book of essays to be edited in collaboration with the Grupo de Sociología de la Cultura from the Universidad Autónoma y Metropolitana in Mexico City. It was organised by Dr. Alistair Malcolm, with papers given by speakers from across the Faculty, including Dr. Cinta Ramblado, Dr. Mairead Moriarty, Professor Eoin Devereux, and Professor Anthony McElligott. The book is intended to consider different aspects of cultural theory, and the symposium contributions embraced such areas as art, music, gender, emotions, representation of power, self-fashioning, scripting by the media, and linguistic landscapes. Questions were chaired by Professor Helen Kelly-Holmes and by Dr. Richard Kirwan, and a lively discussion yielded many useful ideas from those who attended. It was also a special pleasure to welcome five attendees from Mexico.

Centre for Applied Language Studies Books' Launch

In March, members of the Centre for Applied Language Studies (CALS), a research centre within the School of Modern **Applied** Languages and Linguistics, launched 8 recently published volumes at a special books' launch event. The occasion was hosted by the Director of CALS, Professor Fiona Farr and the books were launched by Professor Michael McCarthy, Professor Emeritus at the University of Nottingham, and adjunct member of CALS.



Facilitating the Transition from Emergency Teaching to Fully Online

Dr. Darina Slattery and Jess Beeley are members of the UL Learning Technology Forum (LTF), which coordinates professional development in the area of technology-enhanced learning and provides support to the campus community. The LTF comprises members from across UL, who planned a suite of resources and training sessions that would facilitate remote working and learning. All the resources developed by members of the LTF are available online.

Once the lockdown commenced in mid-March, Darina and Jess provided extensive support to AHSS teaching and administration staff. Darina's on-campus DUO workshops, which provide participants with the knowledge and skills needed to design and develop blended and online programmes, were redesigned and offered in the form of two synchronous webinars. The first webinar covered the planning and design phases and the second webinar covered the delivery and evaluation phases.

Complementing the DUO workshops, Jess developed a six-week training course on Sulis. The course centered on a module template, designed by Jess and translated into Irish with the assistance of Aonad na Gaeilge. In addition, Jess developed online orientation sites, which were rolled out to programmes across the faculty, thereby preparing incoming students for online learning.

Darina and Jess also contributed to an early draft of the UL Guidelines for Preparing Teaching and Learning, which originated in the AHSS faculty office and was subsequently adopted campus-wide.



They are also members of the Effective Technology Support (ETS) Working Group, which met weekly during the summer to carry out a campus-wide review of third party relationships with educational technology partners, and to make a start on an institutional virtual learning environment (VLE) review.

While many teaching staff report that they feel more comfortable using technology now, than they did back in March, the LTF still has more work to do. More recently, the LTF launched its blog series, which includes a three-part posting by Darina. The LTF will be rolling out additional resources in the coming weeks and months.



Professor Eoin Devereux invited to write essay for The Cranberries release of 'No Need To Argue'

Universal Music London have just released a box set release of The Cranberries second album 'No Need To Argue'. The band asked Professor Eoin Devereux of the Popular Music and Popular Culture Research Cluster, AHSS to write an extended essay on the album's history to accompany the new release.

Eoin's essay examines the making of the record with producer Stephen Street, the design of its artwork and it also contains a detailed account of the writing of songs such as 'Twenty One' and 'Zombie'. He documents, for the first time, how 'Zombie' first came to life in a small garage in Mungret, County Limerick and examines the influences of Church singing and Sean Nos on the late Dolores O'Riordan's unique voice. Earlier this Summer, Eoin was also asked to MC a live broadcast with the band to announce the release of their record. The event featured the band in discussion with Eoin and responding to fan questions from all over the world. addition to this, Eoin is also the author of 'Waltzing Back' a 10,000 word essay which was published in 2018 with the re-release of the band's 'Everybody Else is Doing It, So Why Can't We?'

Changemakers Conference

On 13 and 14 February 2020, over 250 festival-makers from across the country gathered in UL to take part in the Changemakers conference. Developed in partnership with the MA Festive Arts at the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance, this conference was the first national gathering of festival makers and festival stakeholders in Ireland. The aim the to facilitate event was connections, and to listen to and learn from this group of people who invest their time and energy in making festivals happen, year on year.

The conference was titled Changemakers, reflecting the transformative impact of festivals on their communities. The full programme can be found **here**.





International Agreement with Algerian Government

In February of this year, UL signed a "game-changing" International agreement with the Algerian government.

The ground-breaking research capacity building project, aims to support the up-skilling of young Algerian academics to PhD level through a specially designed International Structured PhD programme. The programme with provide a professional development focus in Year 1 on English as a Medium of Instruction and participants will then undertake a PhD research project from Years 2-4 with the supervisory panel at the University of Limerick. The project supports a decision by the Algerian Ministry of Higher Education to change the language of instruction in Higher Education from French to English.

The PhD was designed after a think tank of specialists and administration officials came together to find ways to open up the international environment for Algerian universities. A Memorandum of Understanding between UL and the Algerian Ministry of Education has been signed agreeing to the relationship and the fee structure over the first four years of the project, as well as a contract quaranteeing ≤ 5.5 million for UL on the initial intake

We are all Irish IWAMD St.Patrick's Day Video

Samhain: Presentations of Research



Unsilencing Black Voices

Sandrine Uwase Ndahiro BA '18/MA '19 moved from her home in Rwanda to Ireland in 2006. A student, teacher and documentary maker, Sandrine recently co-founded a film project entitled "Unsilencing Black Voices". She believed it was time to start talking about her own experiences with racism, while also providing a platform for other black voices in Ireland.

A first class honours graduate twice-over, Sandrine is currently in the first-year of pursuing a Ph.D. Her research centres around third-generation African writers, such as Afrofuturists, who have emerged during the era of late liberalism and who have introduced multiple and nuanced perspectives for reflecting on African lives and aspirations.

'Unsilencing Black Voices' was recently chosen in its line-up by the 2020 Dublin Arts and Human Rights Festival to showcase and highlight the extraordinary work of human rights defenders in Ireland and around the world. Working on this documentary project provided Sandrine with the opportunity to incorporate her research interests and cultural background to highlight black lived experiences in Ireland.

Afrofuturists

This past summer, Sandrine and her friend Catherine Osikoya (pictured), a fifth-year architecture student at UL embarked on a new project. "We were inspired by the global resurgence of the Black Lives movement" Sandrine says "and launched an online and multimedia campaign to document experiences of racism among the Irish black community". The result was a 'Unsilencina documentary called Voices', released in early August.



Testimonies

The multimedia project collected twenty testimonies from individuals in Limerick, Galway, and Carlow. documentary is free and available to the public is complemented educational tool kits intended for use by primary and secondary schools, as well as third-level institutions. "We hope to continue to dismantle the issue of racism within Irish society" adds Sandrine.

It is Sandrine's hope that this project will provide a platform where black voices can feel heard and finally acknowledged and will create a safe space to discuss this issue of race. Sandrine concludes "I have found my voice and I vow to never be silent again when it comes to this issue of racism."

Dr. Catherine Porter was awarded a PhD in Geography from Queen's University Belfast. She featured in its newsletter Spark which is distributed to thousands of innovation subscribers and contacts across the world, as well as shared across its social media platforms.

The council was recognised by Bloomberg for its creation of a new Covid-19 communications tool and channel for employee feedback, which was a smartphone app for outdoor staff who don't always have access to email. The app enables staff to keep up with their work and key information on how to stay safe while doing so. It has since become a central platform for information related to staff health and wellbeing, leave policies, counselling services and more, particularly with remote working.

UL Graduate wins Pulitzer for Syrian investigation

UL graduate Malachy Browne was named as one of the winners of the prestigious Pulitzer Prize. Mr Browne, a senior story producer with the New York Times, was part of a team of journalists awarded the prize in the international reporting category for a series of stories "exposing the predations of Vladimir Putin's regime", the Pulitzer committee said.

Students from the MA Contemporary Dance Performance at the Irish World Academy took part in an exciting new learning initiative with MFA students in Lighting Design from the Lir Academy Dublin in a supportive and resourced teaching environment to learn about and experiment with lighting design Mentored dance productions. choreographer Liz Roche and lighting designer Sinead Wallace, with Dr. Jenny director Roche (Course Contemporary Dance Performance) the dance students, Yumi Lee, Melissa Bori, Adrika Subhash and Wu Fei, were paired with lighting design students to develop and produce new choreographic works, which were then showcased performance at the Lir Academy in January.

School of Law Alumni Mentoring Network

The inaugural UL School of Law Alumni Mentoring Programme took place in the academic year 2019/2020. Due to Covid-19 the Programme has temporarily moved online. The Programme pairs over forty students from final year Law Plus, Law and Accounting and final year Graduate Entry programmes with mentors who have previously studied in the School of Law. All mentors give generously of their time.

Mentors come from LK Shields Solicitors. William Fry Solicitors, A&L Goodbody Solicitors, Holmes O'Malley Sexton Solicitors Limerick, Sweeney McGann Solicitors Limerick, Mason Hayes and Curran Solicitors Dublin, Michael Staines & Co Solicitors Dublin, Michael Hourigan Barrister at Law and the State Solicitor's Office. The mentors offer guidance on CV / interview preparation, tips on securing training contracts, and guidance on career planning. The mentors meet online with groups of four students. Mentors also communicate with each of their mentees individually, to offer one to one advice on career planning. The Programme was created in direct response to the wishes of students to have more engagement with those working in the legal profession and to establish connections with legal professionals for future work opportunities.



Geoffrey (Adjunct Professor Shannon Professor at the School of Law and Deputy Director of Education at the Law Society of Ireland) and his colleagues in the Law Society have prepared an information video for students on the Programme. The Programme was created and is directed by Dr. Norah Burns, Co-Director of Clinical Legal Education in the School of Law. Dr. Burns conducted a pre course survey with students to ascertain their needs and what they would like to achieve from the Programme, these suggestions will be incorporated into the Programme going forward. The Programme was also chosen as one of the pilot projects for AHSS Faculty Teaching Board Funding for 2020/2021.







100 Years of Jimín Mháire Thaidhg

A special event took place at Aonad na Gaeilge, the Irish Language Centre at UL in December 2019 to mark 100 years of Jimín Mháire Thaidhg written by An Seabhac (Pádraig Ó Siochfhradha). Invited guests, relatives and experts on An Seabhac from Corca Dhuibhne and beyond participated in an intimate reading and literary analysis session. Items from An Seabhac private and public collections were also exhibited at UL Special Collections. Excerpts from Jimín were shared in a novel awareness raising campaign on Twitter @AonadnaG over a period of thirty days. UL teacher education students of Irish designed a resource pack for teachers and pupils in immersion schools, where the book is prescribed material on the Junior Cycle Specification for Irish. This was published on the Aonad na Gaeilge blog. Materials include audio versions of the text read by Eamon Ó Siochrú, nephew of An Seabhac. It prompted a new cataloguing initiative led by UL History Department (Dr. Ciara Breathnach). It also helped nurture stronger UL links with the Gaeltacht community of West Kerry and a new association with the Dingle Literary Festival.


Wikipedia editing masterclass and Faculty lecture
