Since the last list of events (see Newsletter December 1998), the Centre for Irish-German Studies and its staff have been engaged in a number of research, publication and teaching activities. The Centre was pleased to welcome further distinguished speakers to take part in the Centre's lecture series.

# What we have been doing ...

Dr Dagmar Schiek gave a presentation on EU law and its consequences for German and Irish legislation in March 1999. Later that month, Mr Reinhard Schmidt-Supprian, Director of the Goethe Institute Dublin, gave a talk on the Goethe Institute's work in Ireland and the world.

To mark the centenary of Leo Weisgerber's birthday, the renowned German celticist, a conference took place at the University of Münster in March, at which Dr Joachim Lerchenmueller presented a paper on Weisgerber's wartime activities in occupied Britanny.

Dr Veronica O'Regan was invited to the Fachhochschule Aargau in Baden, Switzerland, in April to give a seminar on the Northern Ireland conflict.

On the first bi-annual conference of the Irish Association for Contemporary European Studies in Dublin this April, Dr Joachim Lerchenmueller gave a paper on Germany's policy of "European integration" during World War II.

In May, Dr Gisela Holfter and Claire O'Reilly attended the European Convention of the Association for Business Communication in Helsinki, where they presented papers on projects in Business German and intercultural training in Irish-German business.

The <u>first issue of the Yearbook</u> of the Centre for Irish-German Studies was launched by the Cultural Attache of the German Embassy in Dublin, Mr Hans von Hengstenberg, on 28 June.

In July, Dr Joachim Lerchenmueller visited the Institut für Zeitgeschichte, Munich, to present the findings of his research into Historiography under National Socialism before the members of the Institute.

Dr Joachim Fischer was awarded a research scholarship for senior academics by the German Academic Exchange service (DAAD).

The 2nd German-Irish Masterclasses in Ireland for Wind and Brass Instruments took place at the University of Limerick from 18-29 August. They attracted 33 participants who demonstrated their skills at the final concert on 29 August.
