Introduction

Welcome to a new season in Irish-German Studies. There are a number of books, international conferences, readings and other events to take note of. We are looking forward to seeing you at those taking place in the next few months. We would also like to give you a brief overview of events since April. This autumn has been a special time for us as we were celebrating the 10^{th} anniversary of the founding of the Centre for Irish-German Studies. This was commemorated with our 9^{th} international conference in Irish-German Studies, a great event with over a hundred participants and media coverage in local and national newspapers, Lyric FM and reports by several German radio stations (see inside for a conference report).

Events and Developments since April 2007

Fellowships and Awards

Heiko Walkenhorst, member of the Centre and lecturer in Politics and Public Administration has been awarded a fellowship at the TransState Research Centre (University of Bremen) for the duration of 10 months. Heiko will be analysing the UK's position within the Bologna process.

Claudia Reese, PhD student at the Centre, received a scholarship of the Department of Languages and Cultural Studies for 2007/8 with a possibility of an extension for another year.

German-Irish Business Award

The Centre for Irish-German Studies was the first Irish recipient of the new "German-Irish Business Award", sponsored by IDA, Enterprise Ireland, BIM, Tourism Ireland, IFoG und GILBA. The Institute of Celtic Studies at the University of Bonn and the Law & Business Faculty at the University of Mainz, Germany, were the other prize winners this year. The award was announced on the second day of the 9th Limerick Conference in Irish-German Studies on "Heinrich Böll and Ireland" (see below). At the award ceremony, Mr Elmar Conrads-Hassel, President of the German Ireland Fund, paid tribute to the work of the Centre for Irish-German Studies and handed over a prize to the Centre's directors, Dr Joachim Fischer and Dr Gisela Holfter and promising a cheque of €1,000.

Currently completing her PhD in Comparative Literature at the Charles University, Prague on revenge in Ingeborg Bachmann's "Der Fall Franza" and Jules Barbey d'Aurevilly's "La vengeance d'une femme", Marcela has also been a free-lance writer for the *Neue Zürcher Zeitung*.

Uwe Lorenz came for six weeks from Chemnitz to help with the preparations for the 9th Limerick Conference and proved to be of great assistance and a calm presence in hectic days.

Julia Senzig (M.A., Universität des Saarlands) joined us as a trainee in September. She is also teaching language classes in German.

9th Limerick Conference in Irish-German Studies

The conference to celebrate ten years of the Centre for Irish-German Studies at the University of Limerick was devoted to German Nobel Prize winner Heinrich Böll's highly influential *Irisches Tagebuch* and its reverberations. For the participants it was an excellent opportunity not only to explore the specific impact of the journal some fifty years on, but also to examine further areas of intersection between the Irish and the German cultures.

Conference organiser Dr Gisela Holfter opted for one thread of inter-related sessions so that everybody could participate in all the sessions and a real dialogue could develop among conference participants over the course of the three days.

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The conference was very much in the spirit of the international work of the Centre for Irish-German Studies in that there was an impressive mixture of papers by academics and post-graduates from Canada, South Korea, Germany, Ireland, Sweden and the United Kingdom. The academic dimension was complemented by a number of contributions and reflections by writers, musicians, people working in the art world and politicians.

Literary historians were obviously in the forefront of the conference. The literary historiographical and socio-cultural framework was established by Professor Patrick O'Neill from Kingston University, Canada with his talk entitled 'Kennst du das Land?: Ireland and the German Literary Imagination' and Professor Eda Sagarra of TCD Dublin with her talk 'Heinrich Böll: the Father of German Tourism in Ireland'. Narrowing the focus further, Thorsten Päplow of Göteborg University, Sweden, who has since successfully defended his doctoral dissertation, talked about 'New perspectives on Heinrich Böll's Irisches Tagebuch'. One of the leading experts on Böll, Dr Jochen Schubert who works at the Böll Archive in Cologne presented a fascinating paper entitled 'Zur Poetik des Tagebuchs'. Widening out the scope of the discussion to Irish-German literary links since WWII there were papers by Professor Emeritus Eoin Bourke, Berlin/Galway on 'Hagena, Joyce and the sea', by Dr Marieke Krajenbrink of the University of Limerick, the co-organiser of the 2007 conference on crime fiction, on 'Leonie Swann's sheep mystery Glennkill' and by Sabine Egger, of Mary Immaculate College, UL, on 'Wilhelm Lehmann and Ireland'.

One of the great pleasures of the conference was the combination of presentations by academics and by artistic practitioners, be it in the field of literature, art or music. Leading Irish author Hugo Hamilton captivated his audience with a reading from his new novel *Die redselige Insel (The Island of Talking. An Irish Journal Fifty Years after Heinrich Böll)*. The dialogue created between prolific author, translator and publisher Gabriel Rosenstock and his translator Hans Christian Oeser – a rare opportunity to hear English, Irish and German versions of Rosenstock's multi-faceted poems - was extremely well received. Aosdána member and poet Eva Bourke from Galway talked about the links between her German origins and Ireland, the country where she has spent many decades.

The Director of the Hunt Museum in Limerick, Dr Virginia Teehan opened the exhibition of works of art by Böll's son René Böll entitled 'Islands in the sea' and works by Günther Becker created on Achill Island and inspired by the journal. The talk by 80-year-old sculptor and Aosdána member Imogen Stewart was an excellent example of how Irish-German artistic connections

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provide a rich and as yet largely unresearched seam of fascinating material. Imogen gave a brief introduction to her formative years studying in southern Germany, and explained why she had moved to Ireland in the late 1940s. In a series of slides it became abundantly clear that Ireland is a key influence on her work, which is a fusion of Irish culture and German and medieval art and sculpture. The mixture of academic research and the pleasure of experiencing the creative arts first-hand was also to be seen in the musical sphere. The historical links between the history of Irish and German music which Dr Gareth Cox of Mary Immaculate College, UL, traced were then complemented by the personal account by Irish Chamber Orchestra Director John Kelly, who gave a short performance on the violin.

How is the heritage of Heinrich Böll's *Irish Journal* physically manifested in Ireland? Poet John F Deane, himself from Achill Island and the initiator of the Böll Cottage on Achill discussed the role of the Cottage with Dr Edward King, Achill (President Böll Committee, Achill) and Dr Hermann Rasche from the University of Galway.

In addition to the many other different appeals to the eyes and ears in the conference sessions there was also a showing of Heinrich Böll's film *Children of Eire*, and an opportunity to see a poster exhibition relating to Heinrich Böll and his literary work which was organised by the Böll Archive in Cologne.

Reflections and comparisons of Ireland and Germany were uppermost in the panel discussion with John Gormley, T.D., Minister for the Environment & Local Government, Dr Martin Mansergh, T.D., H.E. David Donoghue, Irish Ambassador in Germany, H.E. Christian Pauls, German Ambassador in Ireland and H.E. Sean O'hUiginn, Irish Ambassador in Italy (formerly in Germany). While Heinrich Böll's view of Ireland were sensitively discussed as well, the topics were wide-ranging, and the debate at times heated.

There is no doubt that Irish-German Studies remains a rich seam to explore and it is to be hoped that both the academics and the practitioners can be persuaded to contribute to a volume which would be a fitting tribute to the influence of Heinrich Böll's *Irish Journal*.

Book launches

Irish-German Encounters (edited by G. Holfter / H.-W. Schmidt-Hannisa, WVT: Trier 2007 (Irish-German Studies 2)) was launched by Prof Eda Sagarra on 30 August 2007 with a moving tribute to Dr Hermann Rasche to



whom the volume is dedicated to mark his retirement from NUI Galway this autumn after some thirty years of service in the German Department.

The launch of From the Margins to the Centre: Irish Germanists on Swiss Culture and Literature (edited by P. Studer / S. Egger, Oxford: Peter Lang 2007 (German Linguistic and Cultural Studies 18)) was hosted by the Ambassador of Switzerland, Mr Josef Doswald, at the Swiss Embassy in Dublin on 3 May 2007. Dr Marieke Krajenbrink launched the book, followed by contributions of the Swiss writer Gabrielle Alioth and Dr Joachim Fischer.

Reading by Matthias Politycki

On Monday, 15 October 2007 the German writer Matthias Politycki read from his latest works at the University of Limerick. Matthias Politycki was born in 1955 in Karlsruhe. He became a freelance writer in 1990, following an academic career. His first novel, *Aus Fälle/Zerlegung des Regenbogens*, published in 1987, was followed by, among others, *Weiberroman* (1997), *Ein Mann von vierzig Jahren* (2000) and his great Cuba novel *Herr der Hörner* (2005). In addition, Politycki has published several volumes of poetry, short stories and essays and recorded a number of his works as audio books. He has been honoured with a number of literary prizes and awards.

The author is the proponent of what he himself has termed a "new German readability," urging writers to shed experimental writing — which he considers a sign of "shyness" — and assume a "new outwardness." He adds, "It's not necessarily a flaw that a book is entertaining."

Matthias Politicky read a short story as well as some poems. The reading was followed by a lively debate about writing and autobiography as well as the state of literature in post-unification Germany.

International Conferences

<u>Movens</u> - Crossing cultural and aesthetic boundaries – network meeting in Limerick, 8-11 November 2007 with seminars, workshops and masterclasses for postgraduate students.

The 5th Masterclass for postgraduate students of the Centre will break new ground and extent for the first time to postgraduate students from partner universities within the Movens network (Sweden, Slovenia, Great Britain and Germany). The higher demand for the visiting professor will equally be met from within the network by Prof Edgar Platen (Göteborg), Dr Robert Gillet (Queen Mary, London) and Prof Elisabeth Wäghall-Nivre (Stockholm). RIA Conference "IN/DIFFERENCE: Current and Historical Perspectives on Cultures in Contact", University of Limerick, 9 – 10 November 2007

Also of interest to Friends of the Centre for Irish-German Studies may be the forthcoming conference of the Royal Irish Academy Committee for Modern Language, Literary and Cultural Studies which will take place at the University of Limerick on 9-10 November 2007, entitled IN/DIFFERENCE: Current and Historical Perspectives on Cultures in Contact. The conference is looking at responses to difference, from approval of multiculturalism to hostility and the passive, indifferent response we often see to new and different cultures. As such, it ranges from language education and policy through translation, literature, film, history of ideas, and cultural studies. There are over sixty papers from experts in the field from Ireland, the UK, Australia, India, South-Africa, the USA, Austria, Switzerland and Germany. On Saturday 10 November at 6.15pm the writer Hamid Sadr will read from his novel Der Gedächtnissekretär (2005). Hamid Sadr was born in Teheran in 1946 and moved to Austria in 1967. He works as a foreign correspondent of the banned Iranian Writers' Association and is an active member of the Iranian opposition resistance movement, Mossadegh. In 1994 his first novel Gesprächszettel an Dora was published, followed by the award-winning novels Seitab der Mondscheingasse (1999) and Der Gedächtnissekretär (2005). The reading – in both German and English – will take place in the Millstream Common Room, and will be followed by a reception with Austrian wine and fingerfood. Millstream Writers Series

Writer and actor Peter Jankowski, "the man with perhaps the most distinctive Sunday Miscellany voice of all" (Irish Times), will read from his collection of autobiographical writings, Myself Passing By (2000) at the Millstream Common Room, UL, on Thursday, 8 November at 6pm. Peter Jankowski was born in Berlin in 1939. After training at the Max Reinhardt College of Acting in Berlin, he worked for ten years as a professional actor in various German theatres. In 1971 he came to Dublin and for many years taught German language and culture at the Goethe Institute in Dublin until his retirement in 2004. Apart from his work at the Goethe Institute he had several one-man shows and was involved in theatre productions as well as readings of German literature. He acted in various RTE TV productions such as *Caught in a Free State* (Dr. Hermann Goertz), Glenroe (Prof. Helmut Blau), and the docu-dramas No More Blooms!, Lola Montez (King Ludwig I.) and Grandpa, Talk to me in Russian! He is perhaps best known for his numerous contributions to Sunday Miscellany. Some of them appeared in Sunday Miscellany Collections and in his autobiography Myself Passing By (2000). Together with Brian Lynch, he also translated German poetry into English (eg. Paul Celan: 65 Poems, 1986) and Irish poetry into German (eg. Easter Snow/Osterschnee, 1993). He will be reading from his autobiography and some pieces for Sunday Miscellany that have not yet been broadcast. This event is organized jointly



by the Centre, Dept. of LCS and Campus Life Services, UL. The reading is preceded by a wine reception. Contact: J. Fischer.
