University of Limerick

Established in 1972, the University of Limerick is an independent, internationally focused university with over 16,500 students and approximately 1,700 staff. It is a young, energetic and enterprising university with a proud record of innovation in education and excellence in research and scholarship. The University offers programmes across a wide range of disciplines, including arts, business, engineering and construction, health and medicine, information and communication technology, law, mathematics and natural sciences. UL has many marketing-leading programmes and several which are unique in Ireland. Programmes such as our BA Arts degree and the Bachelor of Business Studies are amongst the largest in Ireland and some of our Teacher Education programmes are the only ones of their kind. The University's mission is to build on the expertise of our scholars in creating, harnessing and imparting knowledge for the benefit of our students and the enrichment of our community.

The University is recognised as possessing one of the most spectacular and environmentally sympathetic third-level campuses in the world. The campus has unrivalled sports and cultural facilities. 

Ireland, TravelRequirements and Arrival

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Documents to Bring

Generally, to open a bank account you require proof of source of funds documentation. This could be 6 months (up to the current month) of bank statements from your home country. These are your parents' accounts if they are funding you or, your own accounts if you are self-funding. The documents you bring will have to be certified/notarised in your home country before you arrive. If you have already arrived, you will have to organise for someone in your home country to help you with this. Statements must be in English or else you must provide a certified translation.

- Check your passport is in date for the duration of your time in Ireland
- Make sure you have all the required documents to support your visa and the documentation for extending your visa to study and for opening a bank account.
- UL offer letter sent via email or hardcopy
- Proof of Funds
- Medical Insurance documentation
- Travel Insurance documentation
- Medical prescriptions and documents you need regularly. If you are travelling with medical equipment such as syringes or Epi Pens, you will need clearance from your airline. Make sure the prescriptions state the chemical names of the active ingredients and not just the brand name. Check with your airline regarding all medications as you may be travelling through more than one country to arrive in Ireland. Check that the medication is legal in Ireland and can be brought into the country. Your doctor can help with this.
- Medical information translated into English should you have a condition where you will need a regular prescription or medical consultations
- Tip: Make sure you leave copies of the documents and your passport with a family member in the event that they are misplaced so they can email copies when you need them

Climate:

Check out <u>The Irish Meteorological Service</u> for weather and climate information. Winters in Ireland are mild and summers temperate, due to the prevailing south- westerly winds and the influence of the warm water of the North Atlantic Drift. Ireland has a mild climate all year, averaging 2°-7°C (35°-45°F) in winter and 18°-24°C (65°-75°F) in summer. May and June are the sunniest months.

Packing Tips

The essentials for your carry-on bag include:

- Face masks, hand sanitiser (under 100ml) and a disposable bag to dispose of used masks. Recommended time for wearing one mask is four hours make sure you have enough to change during your journey, don't forget to count the travel to and from airports
- Thermometer to continue to track your symptoms on arrival
- Check the airline website for passenger requirements as they may differ from airline to airline
- A towel and a change of clothes for when you arrive at your accommodation.
- Your important documents
- Medications that you will need and original documentation related to the medications such as a certificate from the doctor and a prescription. Make sure medications are in their original packaging.
- Spare pair of glasses or contact lenses and the lens prescription
- Euro currency: Euro notes come in seven denominations 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 Euro. The 5, 10 and 50-euro notes are the most common notes in circulation. It is 100 cents to the Euro and coins are in denominations of 5, 10, 20 and 50 cents and 1 and 2 Euros. Note due to COVID-19 paying by card is more popular to avoid handling coins, however, there is a minimum spend for card transactions generally 5 euro.
- Some snacks in case the airline does not have a food service running
- Your phone and charger. A travel adapter is also useful. The standard electricity voltage is between 220

 240 volts. The frequency is 50 Hertz, the same as in most parts of Europe. If your electrical items are not suited to work under these conditions, you should equip yourself with a transformer. Buildings in Ireland have sockets for 13 amp square pin fused plugs. Adaptors are found in most supermarkets, in order to make your electronics compatible with the three-pin sockets.

Time Zone

Don't forget the change the time-zone before you travel.

Ireland is in the same time zone as the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (UK), Greenwich Mean Time (GMT). The clocks change twice yearly for summer time. The summer time period starts the last Sunday in March at 1.00am GMT, i.e. the clock goes forward one hour. The summertime period ends the last Sunday in October at 1.00am GMT, i.e. the clock goes back one hour.



The Glucksman Library supports the teaching, learning and research activities of the University of Limerick by providing quality information resources, education, support and facilities to students, faculty, staff and researchers. With over one million in-person visits annually and 1.5 million downloads from the digital collections, the Glucksman Library is one of the most popular and heavily used places on campus. The Library is a well-designed, modern building offering a pleasant and comfortable study environment. The Lewis L. and Loretta Brennan Glucksman Library opened in 1998 as a 6,900 square metre facility spread across three floors. Its new wing opened in 2018 and now comprises of

- Study Rooms available for group bookings
- Wireless internet access throughout the library and wired access at all desks on floors 1 and 2
- Plaza café located adjacent to the library entrance



Library Jargon Buster

Bibliography A list of books or a list of sources on a particular topic.

Catalogue An online database, which lists the library's collection of print and audio-visual resources.

Citation A brief description of a publication refering to a specific passage, text, author etc. It appears as a Reference or Footnote and contains sufficient details to enable you to locale the publication. Please refer to the library's booklet Cite It Right for help with referencing.

Database or an index. It often includes details of individual articles within journals and sometimes chapters in books. It is searchable.

Dewey decimal Shelf Mark A code that appears on a label on the spine of each item in the Library numbering subject from 000 to 999.

E-book or E-Journal A book or journal that is in electronic format and can be read in full online.

Inter-Library Loan (ILL) A loan made between libraries which you may need to request if items you want are not held by the Library in print or online.

Journal (also called periodical or serial) A publication containing scholarly articles and published at regular intervals.

Journal Article A piece of research written by an academic or other expert, to communicate new ideas or findings to the wider research community. Several articles are published together or within journal issue.

Reference collection This describes items that you may use in the Library but may not borrow such as dictionaries and atlases.

Short Ioan 3 hour and 24-hour short Ioan items are located on the ground floor of the Library behind the Information Desk. 3 day and 7 day short Ioan items can be found with standard Ioan items on floors 1 and 2.

Special Collections A collection of old and rare books, manuscripts and other archive materials. Special Collections can be consulted on the second floor of the Library.

Store Level This is a store room on the garden level of the Library, CLC-003, where lesser used items such as books, journals, reference material and back runs of newspapers areheld.

Summon This is the Library's search engine. It allows you to find items that are in the library catalogue in addition to other electronic material that the Library own

Television, Radio, Podcasts, Newspapers and Magazines Links

Ireland has a free national digital television service called <u>Saorview</u>. Television channels available in the Republic of Ireland are RTÉ One, RTÉ2, Virgin Media One, TG4, Virgin Media Two, Virgin Media Three and Virgin Media Sport. British TV channels can be picked up in most parts of Ireland on Cable TV and satellite.

You can download the RTE player app on your device to watch <u>RTE player</u> while you are here.

There are six national radio stations and many local ones. A full list and links are available from the <u>Broadcasting Authority of Ireland</u>, make sure to check out the local Limerick radio stations.

www.podcasts.ie is a free site with performances, interviews and readings by Irish writers.

Ireland also offers membership to public libraries as free to everyone. You can join the Irish public library <u>online</u>. Online services include ebooks, audiobooks. Rb Digital for access to free international magazines and comics, Press reader for access to online newspapers world wide, transparent languages for language learning and universal classes for online courses.

The Student Health Centre

Welcome to the Student Health Centre | University of Limerick (ul.ie)

The Student Health Centre operates a dedicated GP service for all students on campus. Services include access to: Doctor (GP), Nurse, contraceptive clinics, Sexual Health Clinic, Physiotherapy and exam-related services as required.

From June 2022 any student who wishes to register with the Student Health Centre and use our service must have an Irish mobile number. We are requesting this due to ongoing difficulties we are having with students using international numbers.

If the student does not wish to obtain an Irish number, the Health Centre can provide them with a list of local doctors who they may request to register with.

Students who have been prescribed medication by their own doctor and who need a repeat prescription will need to bring a letter from their doctor when contacting for the first time. This should outline briefly the condition the medication is prescribed for and state clearly the name, dose and duration of the medication required.

Student Counselling Services

Éist, UL's Student Counselling and Wellbeing Service, is a free professional psychological service available to students to assist them on their progress through university life. UL Éist works using a stepped care model, where students will be offered the appropriate level of support to suit their needs.

Step 1 involves student-attending drop-in, where they will talk to an Assistant Psychologist and discuss the support options. Within Step 1, students may be offered up to four one-to-one cognitive-behavioural support sessions with an AP, giving them a space to work on coping skills and changing of thought processes related to their presentation/concerns. Students can also find psychoeducational videos and materials on <u>our website</u> that may be of use. Step 2 is where students are offered up to 6 sessions of talk therapy sessions with one of our counsellors. Where students require more support, they may move onto Step 3 for additional counselling sessions or to Step 4 where students are referred to a more specialist external service.

Drop-in is the first point of contact with the service, which is currently being run remotely by phone. You can access drop-in by emailing counselling@ul.ie where you will be sent out an intake form and set up with a drop-in time (during term-time, drop-in is run every day from 10-11am and 2-3pm). We are here to listen, should you feel upset, or worried, about something. No problem is too small.

Homesickness and Culture Shock

Some students will experience culture or homesickness while abroad. You might be surprised to feel Homesick in the first few weeks. Homesickness is normal, it is part of the journey and it will pass. Homesickness can be due to a number of "stressors", such as:

- Adjusting to new customs, food, language, people
- Language issues with many different accents
- Missing relationships back home
- Absence of home comforts
- Feeling isolated

The best advice is to remember to rest, eat and sleep at the beginning of your experience as when you are tired all feelings and emotions are intensified. Create a balance between academic work and social life and keep an open mind.

Safety When Out and About:

- When travelling on foot, use busy routes and well-lit walkways. Avoid isolated and dark areas.
- When travelling alone, inform another trusted party of your intended destination, mode of transport and expected time of arrival. Walk facing traffic so that vehicles can see you and you can see what is coming.
- Do not display obvious valuables on your person (jewellery, handbags, etc.) unless completely necessary.
- Only carry the amount of cash that you require. Credit cards and bank cards should be kept securely out of sight and not in back pockets.
- If you think you are being followed, go to the nearest place where there are people, even a private house, and ring the Gardaí. If you are assaulted contact the Gardai (Irish Police) immediately by dialling 999 or 112
- Avoid situations where you are travelling alone at night-time. There is safety in numbers. However, if you must travel on your own, plan your journey by scheduling your journey to coincide with bus and train times or use a taxi if no other convenient transport is available.
- Personal Security Alarms are a convenient safeguard and are available in the Students' Union shop.
- There are 6 E-beacons placed throughout campus for emergency services.





Safety at Home:

- Ensure that your apartment and house doors are locked at all times. When leaving your apartment, check that all windows and doors are locked.
- Never give your apartment keys to anyone else, and do not leave your keys where others could have access to them.
- Before you admit any callers to your apartment, verify their identity ask for identification if you are in doubt.
- Inform a trusted neighbour if you are going away. Ensure that you do not have obvious signs of a vacant apartment curtains drawn during daylight hours, etc.
- Make sure all your property is marked with your own personal identification code. Items of value should be securely locked away.

Regional Writing Centre

The UL Regional Writing Centre (RWC) offers a free and friendly place for all students (undergraduate and postgraduate) to come and address any aspect of their writing. This resource is dedicated to helping students develop strategies to become more confident, critical and autonomous writers.

The Regional Writing Centre practices a non-invasive, inductive approach to writing development, utilising peer-tutors who work with both undergraduate and postgraduate students to identify and evaluate their writing situation and practices so that they can evaluate and improve the effectiveness of their research and writing strategies. Our tutors can't fix or write your paper for you, but they will discuss it with you, give you feedback, help you establish a structure and give you tips on strategies so that you can continue to successfully develop the paper and yourself as a writer.

When a student who has English as a second or other language runs into difficulties while writing their papers, it may be a language problem or it may be a writing problem or it may be both. Peer tutors are not language specialists, but good writers who understand what it's like to worry about a paper, to panic over deadlines, to wonder if an assignment is proceeding on the right track or if they have hit a writing wall. If there are language issues, peer tutors can suggest some strategies that good writers might use to access the appropriate language or suggest some language-learning resources that you could use to improve your use of English.

In addition to peer tutors, the RWC offers workshops on writing in academic contexts, writing-related events and access to a number of online writing resources on the <u>homepage</u>

This module runs in both autumn and spring semesters.



Immigration and ConsularServices

Registering with Immigration

All students admitted by the Irish Immigration Officers, will have their passports computer swiped and date stamped, endorsing them to register with the Immigration Office. Immigration registration takes place at the Garda Siochána (police) station at Henry Street in Limerick city centre during normal office hours, excluding public holidays.

UL Global are arranging with immigration and will update you when all details regarding appointments have been confirmed. Do not go to the immigration office until UL Global provide you with the required details.

To register with Immigration, students will be required to produce the following

- Offer Letter from the University of Limerick
- Valid Passport
- An Immigration Letter or Visa Support Letter
- €300 fee payable by bank giro or credit card (no cash will be accepted)
- Proof of medical insurance
- Proof of Address in Ireland this can be a letter from the landlord
- Students may also be asked to produce another form of identification
- Proof of funds for stay in Ireland (Bank Statement for €1500 or Letter of Financial Guarantee)
- Non -EU students from visa required countries no longer need to produce at registration proof of finance

Appointment

Non-EU students residing in Ireland for more than three months must register with the Immigration Officer within 90 days of arrival.

Fee

A fee for Immigration Certificates of Registration issued to non-EU nationals was introduced with effect from 27th May 2006. On registration with the Immigration Registration Officer, a non-EEA national receives an immigration certificate of registration (IRP Registration Card).

Payment

Registration must be made at the local registration office (Henry Street Garda Station, Limerick).

- Payment can only be made by bank giro or by credit card.
- The person whose name is on the credit card must be present at the Garda Station
- Therefore students cannot use the credit cards of parents, relatives etc. at home, but can use the credit card of a friend who is present at the appointment
- Cash is not accepted
- As of November 2012, a fee of €300 will be charged in respect of each registration certificate_

Visitors to Limerick City will have no problems finding things to see and things to do. The historic nature of Ireland's third largest city, and indeed the beautiful nature of its environs, provides many areas of interest. Keep an eye on <u>I love Limerick</u> for up to date events and activities taking place in the city. A few of the main attractions are listed below but there are many more to discover.

Read about some of the things other international students have done

King John's Castle

King John's Castle, on the south side of Thomond Bridge, built in 1210 "to dominate the bridge and watch towards Thomond," is one of the finest examples of fortified Norman architecture in Ireland. The castle is roughly square on plan. Its 60-metre frontage along the river is flanked by two massive round towers, each over 15m in diameter, with walls 3m thick. The tower nearest the Bridge, the first portion of the castle to be erected, still bears the scars of the besieging cannon of 1691. Eastwards of this tower in the north wall, is the castle gate entrance. On the three landsides, the castle was protected by a deep, broad moat, fed with water from the Shannon. Only the narrow drawbridge to the castle gate allowed entry. Work is continuing to improve their conditions of the remaining walls and towers.

St. Mary's Cathedral

At the junction of Nicholas Street and Bridge Street stands St. Mary's cathedral, the ecclesiastical centre of the fortress for hundreds of years. The full title of this cathedral is the "Cathedral and Parochial church of the Blessed Virgin Mary." It was built in 1172 by Donal Mór O'Brien, the last king of Munster.

Tourists will find excellent documentation of historical remains within the ancient cathedral itself. The most noteworthy relics of the past are the ancient altar stone used when mass was celebrated in the cathedral, and the splendidly carved misericords in the choir. The misericords are unique in Ireland as the only surviving pre-Elizabethan carvings that date from 1480.

Bunratty Castle and Folk Park

Bunratty Castle is the most complete and authentic medieval fortress in Ireland. Built in 1425, it was restored in 1954 to its former medieval splendour and now contains mainly 15th and 16th century furnishings, tapestries, and works of art. Within the grounds of Bunratty Castle is Bunratty Folk Park, where 19th century life is recreated for visitors. Set on 26 acres, the impressive park features over 30 buildings in a 'living' village and rural setting.

How dolgetthere?

- The 304 bus departs from the main university bus stop, The Stables, every 15 minutes. The bus costs €1.90 €2.20 for a single ticket and can be paid in cash on the bus. The bus returns to UL from William Street in Limerick City Centre. You can buy a day-saver ticket for Bus Eireann City Bus Service for around €3.20.
- Aldi and Lidl are grocery stores within walking distance of UL
- Some student prefer to avail of the <u>Tesco Delivery</u> Service; where you can order your groceries online and have them delivered for a fee of €3-€7.


Travel and Transport

It is easy to get around Limerick on foot or bike. To walk across town from St. Mary's Cathedral to the train station takes about 15 minutes. Taxis are outside the tourist office, bus station, train station, O'Connell Street, William Street and Sarsfield Street. Bus Eireann public buses 304, 304A and 308 service the University of Limerick. The current Bus fare for a single trip within the city limits is \in 2.40. There are two bus stops in the University, one inside the Main Entrance and the second outside The Student Life Courtyard.

Private buses run from Arthur's Quay in the city and from the main bus stop on campus. TheM7 express can take you to Dublin for $\in 10$ one way. See www.dublincoach.ie for more details.

Students can apply for a Leap Card **ONLY if you are staying more than 6 months.** This card allows you to pay for transport as a pay as you go; you can use prepaid tickets and use as student ID to buy discounted paper tickets for areas outside major cities. You can also apply online. The card can be topped up in Spar shop, on Campus.

Bus Éireann Colbert Station Limerick

Services operate from the bus and train station, a short walk south of the city centre. There are regular connections to Dublin (\in 19.50 return, 2 hours and 30 minutes), Tralee (\in 17.50 return, 2 hours), Cork (\in 17.50, 1 hour and 50 minutes), Galway (\in 17.50 return, 1 hour and 30 minutes), Killarney, Rosslare, Donegal, Sligo, Shannon, Derry and most other centres. You can get off in Limerick at the bus stop on O'Connell Street. There is a bureau de change at the Bus Éireann information desk.



- Never assume a driver sees you.



Driving in Ireland

In Ireland, people drive on the left-hand side of the road. In towns and cities, the speed limit is normally 20 to 50 kilometres per hour depending on the part of the town. On certain roads, higher limits may apply. A general speed limit of 80 to 100 kilometres per hour applies on all roads except for motorways where a speed limit of 120 kilometres per hour applies.

The laws regarding speeding, drink-driving and wearing seatbelts in Ireland are very strict. There is a penalty point system in operation, whereby points will be added to your driving licence for roadsafety offences.
