Junior Health Sciences Academy Early Careers Event

Transition Year and 5th Year students from across the Mid-West region attended the Junior Health Sciences Academy, Virtual 'Early Careers' Event on March 2nd and 3rd. This event was developed and supported by colleagues from UL, UL Hospitals and Mid-West Community Healthcare in partnership with Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board's Schools Division and Limerick Education Centre.


The concept was developed to reach out to schools and students, particularly those students in Transition Year, who cannot visit hospitals or other clinical settings for work experience. It was designed to showcase healthcare as a possible career path.

Over 1,600 students attended over the two days, hearing from staff and students in the areas of nursing & midwifery, paramedic studies, medicine, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech & language therapy, human nutrition & dietetics and clinical psychology. They also heard from clinical staff working in UL Hospitals Group in the areas of podiatry, radiography, medical social work and laboratory science, as well as a community pharmacist.

CAO Developments

Chief Academic Officers (CAOs) act as a link between their hospital groups and universities – ensuring innovation, research and teaching remain at the forefront of Irish healthcare. As COVID-19 made itself known throughout Ireland in 2020 the CAO's began to harness their resources to focus on areas that needed urgent attention. The Chief Academic Officers of the 7 Hospital Groups began meeting weekly to discuss ongoing issues facing students and staff in their respective hospitals and universities.

The CAO group aim to continue their work into 2021 – focusing on:

- the firm establishment of a National Covid-19 Biobank with the HRB,
- progressing the National Simulation Strategy with the NDTP,
- utilising additional funds obtained for NDTP Simulation Training, •
- advancing an Academic Health Science System for Ireland with Minister Donnelly's office in the Department of Health and working to further represent staff and students working in a variety of healthcare roles.

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HealthFusion Team Challenge 2021 #HFTCIRL2021

The 2021 National *Health Fusion Team Challenge* (HFTC) Final was hosted this year by Health Sciences Academy, home of the HFTC. The HFTC is an interdisciplinary case based learning opportunity for students from across healthcare disciplines. It supports the interprofessional working, skills in communication, teamwork, collaboration and problem solving. Under the

leadership of the steering committee from UL and HSA, with support from student mentors in UL and colleagues from the other Universities involved, the final was a huge success with over 120 attendees.

This year, the Health Fusion Team Challenge case study focussed on a pregnant woman from Afghanistan with gestational diabetes. Internal heats in University of Limerick were held in early March, with the winning team going forward to represent UL in the national final. There were four teams competing in

the national final representing University of Limerick, Trinity College Dublin, NUI Galway and University College Cork. At the live event, the student teams presented their case management plans. Prof Sharleen O'Reilly, UCD, presented on her research 'Bump to Baby and Me', and Ekaterina Okonkowo, Migrant Advocate discussed cultural competence in healthcare. The judging panel, comprising experts from UL Hospitals, UL and Migrant Advocacy had a very difficult decision in choosing a winning team but agreed that the winners for 2021 were NUIG! Simulation-Based Education

Simulation allows healthcare providers to learn, rehearse, and practice safely, and the aim of simulation-based education is to improve the safety and effectiveness of healthcare delivery. Under the Chairmanship of Dr John McManus, a multidisciplinary committee has been established to advance simulation education in UHL. Plans are underway to support further education of identified staff to undertake the MSc/PDipSc (Healthcare Simulation and Patient Safety) in Galway. An upgrade of the simulation suite in CERC is planned this year, and the recent appointment of Marcus Grant, simulation technician, will further support this really exciting educational development.
